A Letter from Pastor Jeny

Hello Friends!

I'm extremely excited to launch our new Lectionary cycle this Advent using Year W: A Woman's Lectionary for the Whole Church by Dr. Wilda C. Gafney. For millennia, we have explored scripture through the male lens and most of us were raised to believe that the male experiences within scripture are universal for all people. Given that for the past 100 years, the number of women present in worship each week in churches around the globe has consistently outnumbered the men, it seems time to shift the focus for a while.

While women can certainly find hope, insight, and understanding in men's stories, adjusting for ourselves what we needed when the story didn't reflect us or our experiences, taking the time to focus on women's experiences in scripture is important. Often the stories of women in scripture reflect a time when women were property, had little to no decision-making power over their own lives, and frequently the stories limit women's contribution to the act of childbirth alone. That has an impact on how we view ourselves, our ministries, and our understanding of God.

This year, we will be digging deep into all the spaces were women appear in the text and examining their role as women, as leaders, and as beloved and faithful children of God. I hope you will enjoy the journey right along with me.

Fall Update on the Church Garden

Your church garden team has been working behind the scenes to take care of our colorful and welcoming church garden and to plan ways to make the front of the church more welcoming.

- We watered and weeded the garden three times a week during the hot dry summer. We had hoped to see the rains arrive in September but had to continue to water the dry earth through mid-October.
- In early October we had a pruning party to cut back trees, bushes and plans and prepare them for winter. We also trimmed the groundcover surrounding the sidewalk trees.

• Our talented team member Lisa Snow Lady proposed her vision of making the front of the church more welcoming. She sketched out her idea and the team agreed to present it to Session for agreement and funding. Bronwen presented it to Session on behalf of our team. Session has approved Phase I of our plan. We have purchased and planted three colorful containers to replace the existing pots. We will be working on this project in phases, including incorporating a flowering vine in spring to climb up the post and planting the other beds using drought tolerant and low water plants.

Northminster Support for Our Hungry Neighbors Focus on the Ballard Food Bank

Northminster has a long history of supporting the Ballard Food Bank through a combination of financial contributions through the Deacon's Fund, direct collection of needed goods, and volunteer support. We are grateful to be partnering with many other area non-profits and businesses to respond to our hungry neighbors.

On Thursday November 10th I had the opportunity to tour the Ballard Food Bank with Colleen Martinson, Director of Development and Communications. I was very impressed by what I saw and what I learned. The Food Bank opened its doors in its new facility about one year ago. It is a nicely designed facility that provides a welcoming space for people to gather and sit out front. Inside, there is a spacious light-filled hall with colorful paints and artwork on the walls. Masks are required for everyone inside. A kind greeter welcomes people who enter and gives a mask to those who need them. The greeter also answers questions, directs people to resources, and gives them a number that will be called when their time to shop arrives.

Ballard Food Bank serves over 6,000 people each month across all its programs. People come from all over Seattle to use the following services.

- The Kindness Cafe is on the left side as one enters the facility. Here, paid staff and volunteers prepare and serve an assortment of hot food. Anyone can order whatever they want for free. The Kindness Café serves 300-400 meals per day. During its first year the Café served 42,000 meals.
- A grocery store style food bank remains the cornerstone program. It looks just like a grocery store, with shopping carts and aisles of produce, canned good and wellness products. People must register before they can shop. Clients gain access when their number is called. Shoppers can choose from a wide variety of healthy foods and wellness products four days a week. There are no income requirements. No- cook bags are available for clients who do not have access to refrigerators and stoves.

- Home delivery of food to housebound clients. During the pandemic the number served increased dramatically from 120 to 900+ households weekly when people couldn't shop in their facility. Currently there is home delivery of about 450 meals per week.
- Weekend food for kids who are food insecure. The Food Bank partners with 20 Northwest area schools to provide weekend meals (3 dinners, two breakfasts, two lunches and snacks) for about 450 kids who are identified as food insecure.
- The Resource Hub. Recognizing that hunger is just a symptom of larger challenges related to poverty and self-sufficiency, the Ballard Food Bank provides mailbox services and works with 18 agency partners to provide stabilizing services and resources. These include emergency assistance payments to prevent eviction and move people out of homelessness, assistance acquiring IDs, connection to job training, counseling, healthcare, and other services. There three small office areas for individual consultations. The day before my tour, they hosted a veterinarian to care for the pets of houseless people (in the parking lot) and a vaccination clinic.

The cost of these services has been increasing sharply as the number of people served has increased and food prices have skyrocketed. Some of the food distributed is harvested from area grocery stores, but much of it is bought in bulk. Pre-pandemic, in 2019, the Food Bank spent \$300,000 on food. They anticipate that in the coming year they will need to spend \$1.5 Million on food for all their programs.

The Food Bank has expressed how grateful they are for the contributions our church makes.

Ways we that we can continue to help include:

- Continue to provide financial support
- Do periodic drives to collect highly needed items and/or
- Volunteer to help.

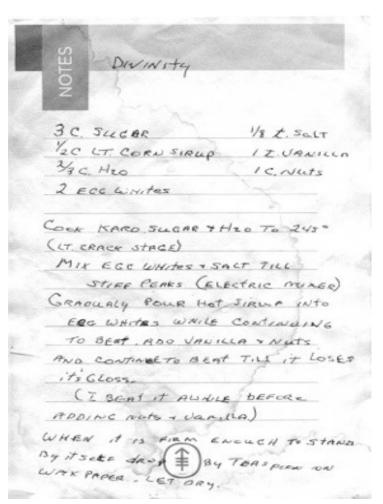

I recently uncovered the church cookbooks from 1947, 1949, 1963, and 1987. In the 1947 edition I found the chocolate sauce recipe my family has used since that date.

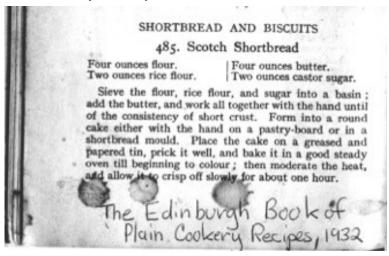
This led me to ask current members for the recipes of food we have savored at church gatherings or have talked about in conversation. Below you will find the divine **Divinity** recipe from **Pat French**. She made 90 packages of these to deliver in one of 2020 Friendship bags! Over the years she has brought this candy to many church events or has been known to hand you a package at church.

Anna Ure has been telling me about her **Scotch Shortbread** recipe which she has been making for over sixty years. Note that the cookbook was published in 1932. And here I thought Rice Flour was a new gourmet ingredient!

Great Grama's Brownie recipe comes from **Julia Miller**. Her family has been making it for 150 years! These made for a delicious treat at coffee hours.

Yes, these recipes could have been reformatted as a new document, but I find the original recipe has an added value for meaningful context! - Compiled by Jan Olson





Great Grama's Brownies

Preheat oven to 350°

Grease + flour a 8"x8" pan Thiller of Clauble recipe for 9"x13" pan)

Melt together in double boiler

1/3 cup butter

4 oz. unsweetened Baker's chocolate

In large bowl beat until light

I cup sugar + 2eggs

In small bowl sift

1/2 cup + I Tablespoon flour

1/4 teaspoon baking powder

Fold chocolate mixture into sugar/egg mixture

Fold in flour/baking powder mixture.

Fold in 1/2 cup chapted walnuts or pecans

if desired. Bake at 350° for 25 minutes
