Letter from the Pastor

Dear Northminster Community,

In line with our previous themes, I'm inviting us this month to consider how Holy Week can have a 21st Century Approach.

Every year it comes almost too soon. The long preparation of Lent gives way to Holy Week where the drama unfolds. It does not take belief in a certain creed to find oneself in Holy Week. The saga of betrayal, jealousy, friendship, loss, grief, death, surprise, and disbelief - these experiences are found in every human story. As we come to this Holy Week, perhaps we can make space in our lives for all of the emotions and experiences that we find.

Do we doubt the existence of God? That too, is part of Holy Week. Do we find ourselves with emotional distance from once close friends or relatives? That too, is part of Holy Week. Do we find ourselves anxious about the future? That too, is a part of Holy Week.

By diminishing Holy Week to the celebration of Easter, we cut off the complexity of human emotions and experiences that are found in the other six days of the week. While our schedules might only allow for the corporate celebration of Easter, there are ways that we can remember the rest of the week, even within the space of our commutes and daily house chores.

Perhaps Maundy Thursday allows space for a five minute personal reflection on the loss of friendship and the grief of being misunderstood. Perhaps Good Friday allows the space for a five minute personal reflection on the experience of mistrusting the universe, giving in to the idea that in fact it is all random with no meaning or purpose. These wild and unsettling experiences are found within the drama of Holy Week. When we lose track of them, we tend to give in to the thought that our faith only provides the grounds for a saccharine perspective. This is not the case. The Christian story offers a deep wealth of complex human experience, and validates these experiences within the very heart of God's story.

In Holy Week we see that God does not shy away from our human experience, but takes it into God's very heart and being.

With Easter comes a proclamation, not of certainty, but of surprise. It opens up a tentative space of hope. The Scriptural story of Easter offers us not ruthless assurance, but the whispering of a story that is almost too good to be true. This delicate and holy space is where we begin to the find the ground of our faith. The promise of the resurrection is just that, a promise. We see bits and pieces. We hear stories from others that confirm the reality. And in the interim, we lean into the promise.

As we move through the rest of Lent and into this month, I will be leaning into the promise. I wonder if you will be too?

Calling all Children's Corner Volunteers, Sunday School Assistants and Parents at NPC


We really need to hear from you at one of our up-coming meetings in May:

What is a New Worshipping Community?


So, with a bit of history and background of the 1001 New Worshipping Communities movement from the last two newsletters, I wanted to offer a concluding perspective on the mission and vision of Coastland Commons.

A value that has emerged for us is that of embodiment; or, another way to capture embodiment is to use a term that may be familiar in the context of the church and theology: *incarnation*. Since many of us feel

at home in theological or biblical language, using Jesus and the concept of the incarnation (God becoming human) is an excellent way to capture how we experience the world: in our *bodies*. The personhood of Jesus teaches us that our bodies matter, and that they do not exist on the margins or in the periphery. The formation of the early Christian church was very concerned with the idea of *embodiment*. In fact, the Christological controversies of the councils (like Nicea or Chalcedon) were in part trying to clarify this very issue. Did it matter that Jesus had a body? Did it matter that Jesus felt pain? Joy? Human pleasure?

I use this as an example to illustrate that Coastland Commons seeks to create spaces where bodies are welcome and affirmed in their fullness. Because of the example of the incarnation, we are moved and called to see our bodies as beautiful things. Christian theology is not at odds with the body; it has been contemplating the body for a long, long time. We see this as a huge opportunity in the life of both the institutional church and in new forms of spirituality that arise from this centuries-old wondering.

For us, this means celebrating the bodies of LGBTQIA+ people as holy in all their glamor and beauty. It means that we strive to keep from commodifying people of color or tokenize their bodies like much of white Christianity has done throughout its sordid history. It means that we love our Jewish, Muslim and interfaith neighbors not in order to change them but to be inspired by their devotion, and similarly devote ourselves to bettering the world through our own understanding of hospitality. I believe that this is not solely the work of Coastland Commons, but also something that we can engage at Northminster as we work to learn about each other and the communities we touch.

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Exploring Our Faith: An Intergenerational Journey

We are excited to announce an all-ages growth and discipleship class for everyone here at Northminster! The goal of "Exploring Our Faith: An Intergenerational Journey" is to examine our Christian faith, as well as our Presbyterian roots in the Reformed tradition, in a gathering of kids, youth and adults over seven weeks. It will be a mixture of interactive small-group discussions here on site, as well as field trips that we are calling "deep dive" opportunities. Our intention is to foster relationship across ages and generations, to create a space to explore and wonder about our faith, and to provide opportunities to engage with other faith communities.

In addition, we are including an option for anyone who wants to become a member at Northminster at the conclusion of our time together. However, this is not exclusively a membership class; we hope that anyone regardless of membership, involvement or age will feel free to join us in getting to know each other better and exploring our faith. All are welcome!

We have seven different offerings over the course of this class:

~Three small-group conversations around different topics that will be held here at **Northminster** from 12:30 - 2:00pm.

~Three "deep dive" opportunities that will take us off-site to experience different faith communities and expressions.

Our vision for participation, if you are interested in joining us, is that you would be able to commit to our first conversation on **March 10th and concluding conversation on April 28th**, and commit to a minimum of 3 other offerings, *one of which must be a "deep dive."* The schedule for these conversations and "deep dives" with brief descriptions are below:

- "What Does It Mean to Be Reformed?" Small Group Conversation on Sunday, March 10th, from 12:30pm 2:00pm at Northminster. We will explore what it means to be part of the Reformed tradition, as well as reflecting on what it means for us to say "reformed and always reforming."
- **Deep Dive Opportunity 1:** Shabbat Service at Bet Alef Meditative Synagogue (1111 Harvard Ave, Seattle, WA), **Friday, March 15th at 7:30pm**. We will join Bet Alef for their Purim festival, which will be portrayed in the style of the musical Hamilton (*dates and times for deep dive opportunities subject to change*).
- **Deep Dive Opportunity 2:** Daily Prayer at Idriss Mosque (1420 Northeast Northgate Way, Seattle, WA 98125), **Sunday, March 24th at 12:00pm**. We will continue to cultivate our relationships with our Muslim friends at Idriss Mosque by visiting their daily prayer *(dates and times for deep dive opportunities subject to change).*
- Deep Dive Opportunity 3: "Tschabalala Self" Art Exhibit at the Frye Art Museum (704 Terry Avenue Seattle, WA 98104), Sunday, March 31st, from 12:30pm 2:30pm. The Frye Museum website describes the exhibit as examining "the intersectionality of race, gender, and sexuality, focusing particularly on the iconographic significance of the black female body in contemporary culture" (dates and times for deep dive opportunities subject to change).
- "How Do We Engage the Bible?" Small Group Conversation on Sunday, April 7th, from 12:30pm 2:00pm at Northminster. We will discuss our own personal interactions with the Bible and learn together as we engage both the generative and troubling aspects of scripture.
- "Getting at What We Understand About God" Group Sharing Time on Sunday, April 28th at 12:30pm 2:00pm at Northminster. We will take some time to hear from one another about what we learned throughout the course of our exploration and to begin articulating what we understand about God.
