### A Letter from Pastor Jeny

As we enter the season of Lent this year, I'm captivated by the complexity and nuance of living in the in-between space. We are on the cusp of spring with some days being full of sunshine, yet winter wind and cold temperatures still envelop us. Some plants, inspired by the increasing sunshine begin to bloom while most of the trees have yet to grow their new leaves. We feel a continued sense of emersion from a years-long pandemic, yet we keep having spikes of illness. Our PNC is about to publish its Ministry Information Form, the final step before moving into the process of interviewing and selecting your new pastor. Everywhere we look, we can see examples of the now and not yet.

This is why this time of year is actually perfect for the reflections of Lent. Where we both contemplate our own finitude as well as our on-going relationship with God. The point of Lent is not meant to be morose, rather to take a deep-dive into our own humanity and explore all the aspects of what it means to live as child of God, including the moment our souls will return to our Creator, full of stories to share with heaven.

Lent is also a time for us reflect on where we feel most separated from God or to examine where we are creating barriers to the relationship. #### "Beyond our Walls" Update for Spring 2023

A team of Northminster folks who are globally curious and community engaged – Dawn, Szu-Yu, Liz, Jonna, Antonio and Adelia - are working to find positive ways for Northminster to engage "Beyond our Walls" particularly in global partnerships. (Two deacons – Dawn & Liz - are on the team so we can be aware of the deacons' liaison and advocacy work with local organizations.) **Our theme for "Beyond our Walls" for the first part of 2023 is Crisis Response.** From bequest funds already set aside by session for assisting others we are responding to the earthquakes that have caused death, injury, trauma and destruction in Syria and Turkey. We are giving \$2,500 (plus designated gifts from the congregation given in February) for earthquake recovery via Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), the crisis response and recovery entity of our denomination, Presbyterian Church USA (PCUSA). [One Great Hour of Sharing offering that we collect during Holy Week funds the "core" work of PDA along with two other PCUSA programs.] In addition, we are giving \$1,500 (from funds allocated to global efforts) to a trusted organization responding to a second very difficult winter in Afghanistan.

We encourage Northminster to be in **prayer** for the people of Turkey and Syria, especially for the congregations in the Synod that includes Syria. Aid and recovery resources continue to be more limited in reaching village and towns in Syria which was in great need before the quake.

Looking ahead, for summer 2023 our "Beyond our Walls" theme will be children, youth, and education and connecting us with Presbyterians in the Democratic Republic of Congo. This will link with the youth emphasis for the Pentecost Offering and Northminster's designation of 40% of that offering. For fall 2023, Antonio is exploring connections for peacemaking and justice alongside PCUSA partners in Central America for the season of Peace and Global Witness.

### **Pastor Nominating Committee Status Report**

What we've done: The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) has been meeting weekly since January 4th. Our first step has been to complete an 8-page Ministry Information Form (MIF) which provides a narrative picture of the mission and ministry of the congregation of Northminster and its sense of call, as well as what we're ideally looking for in a pastor. We prayerfully made use of both the previous 2014 MIF and the 2020 Discernment Overview. Other information on the form includes membership, worship and Christian Education participation numbers. It also establishes an effective salary range.

Where we're at now: The MIF will be reviewed by Session on February 28th.

Next steps: The completed MIF form will be submitted to Presbytery where it will be posted on the PCUSA Church Leadership Connection (CLC). This system will match pastoral candidates seeking new calls based on position type, experience level, salary, language, geographical choice and leadership competencies. For each potential match, the PNC will receive a Personal Information Form (PIF), which is like a resume.

It is important to us to keep you informed about where we are in the process. We will be posting updates on the Northminster website as we have new information to share along with quarterly updates via this newsletter. You are also welcome to contact Bronwen Matthews or Eliana Maxim if you have additional questions.

We ask for your continued prayers for God's guidance as we navigate the PNC process.
